
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Inspecting A House (For Pros By Pros)

This winter it saved me potentially thousands of dollars in repair costs by pointing out the danger of snow build up along the eaves and dormers of my house. It's also helped me identify areas of potential concern where a little preventative maintenance can save me a lot of money down the road. If you are looking for a book that will teach you how to become a home inspector, this is not that book. In fact, I don't think there is an adequate book anywhere that can make you a great home inspector. The only thing that teaches you how to inspect houses is being in the field for a while and seeing the amazing world of property flaws, and delving into housing systems. I am a former Naval pilot, and I wouldn't expect to be able to land on an aircraft carrier after reading one book. The true value in this book, much like the introductory courses I took as a fledgling pilot, is that it gets you familiar with the terminology used around construction and real estate, and gives you just enough information to be dangerous. I am now a real estate investor who helps other new investors get started and this is one of the first books I make them go buy. It is just enough to get you a basic nuts and bolts education on the guts of a house, without getting mired down in minutae of building code and the millions of things that can actually be wrong with a house.

I am a real estate investor, and this book is saving me hundreds and hundreds of dollars on

inspections. After consuming this book, it has enabled me to do my own inspections on potential real estate investments. I can decide if I want to make an offer or not. If I do, then I have potential negotiating areas with the seller. If we agree on a price, then I bring in a certified inspector as a formality, especially if you're applying for a loan. Most lending institutions require that the property be professionally inspected. This book is loaded with color photographs. Amazing for the price it is being offered for. Cauldwell is meticulous, and extremely detailed in his approach. I recommend this book to inspectors, any person that wants to become an inspector, or someone who just wants to look out for their own investment/home.

I gave this book 5 stars, because it is really great for the type of book it is. But I have to tell you what type of book it is, to help you decide whether you want to buy it. This is written as if it is a textbook for a trade school course, for students who are entering the construction industry. The author assumes that the reader will be getting a job, working for a company which sends its employees out to do home inspections. It assumes that the reader starts with little background in the field, and it teaches enough so that the reader ought to be able to fill that role, probably first working as an assistant to an experienced home inspector for a while, before he is going out to do his own inspections. It doesn't go into depth in any one area, but it really is an excellent overview, it does teach the basics in all areas, and this is why I gave it 5 stars.

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
